Course Description:

The framework of this course is analytic. It examines different approaches to the study of international relations. The course focuses on teaching you how to think in general, in addition to dealing with ongoing international events. You will learn a great deal about current international issues and about the evolution of international politics, i.e., the different ways in which war and peace have been explained. Being multidisciplinary by drawing from psychology, economics, sociology, history, and geography our study of international relations will also integrate all the other subfields of political science, including American and comparative politics, as well as political theory.
